273-An act creating a Washington State Reformatory for women, providing for the management thereof, making appropriation for construction and maintenance thereof repealing Chapter 186 of the Laws of 1919 and declaring an emergency

Signed by Governor Hartley

❖ (1929 session)

164-An act relating to osteopathy and amending Section 10063 of Remington's Compiled Statutes
Reported out of committee and died

165-An act relating to the practice of osteopathy and surgery, defining the term "physician" and amending Remington's Compiled Statutes by adding a new section to Chapter V, Title LXVIII, thereof, to be known as Section 10070-1
Reported out of committee and died

263-An act relating to the Washington state reformatory for women, and amending Sections 5 and 17 of Chapter 249 of the Laws of 1927

Went to third reading

290-An act making appropriations for the payment of salaries of certain officers and employees of the state and for the operation, maintenance and other expenses of certain state institutions, departments and offices, for the purchase of land, the construction of buildings and improvements for the various state institutions designated and mentioned, and for emergencies, and for sundry civil expenses of the state government, and for miscellaneous purposes for the fiscal biennium beginning April 1, 1929 and ending March 31, 1931, except as otherwise provided, and declaring that this act shall take effect immediately

Signed by Governor Hartley

302-An act relating to higher educational institutions and establishing a board of higher educational administration, and making an appropriation
