#### Legislative & State Service:

• Senate race was very close; she defeated her opponent, Ted Bloomer by a small margin in the 1941 Senate race. The Senate created a committee to investigate the eligibility of the election because allegedly there were voting irregularities in a dozen South Bend and Raymond precincts. After the investigation she gained five votes and was finally sworn in as Senator.
