- Ellen's husband, Bruce, ran in 1974 for the legislature and lost. When he decided not to run in 1976 she decided to run in his place.
- Introduced a bill that later became an initiative to the people in 1979. This initiative dealt with the question: Shall state tax revenues be limited so that increases do not exceed the growth rate of total state personal income? The voters overwhelming approved the initiative.
