- Originally a member of the Socialist Party
- Her and her husband Burt Farquarson helped found the Washington Commonwealth Federation (WCF)
- Taught at the University of Washington
- She was devoted to issues such as: unemployment and economic dislocation, address wrongs suffered by minorities and correction of injustices, and to work for peace.

Education:

• University of Washington, English Degree, 1925

Community Service:

- During World War II she was committed to working to aid Japanese Americans who had been incarcerated. She
 advanced the case of Gordon Hirabayashi, a Japanese American who refused internment, to the U.S. Supreme
 Court
- Helped restore back pay to a black civilian carpenter who was dismissed by the army because of alleged Communist beliefs.
- Helped with commutation of the life sentence of Ray Becker, a Centralia Massacre victim, after he had served 20 years.
