- First woman to serve in the legislature from Thurston County.
- Public Pension Commission 1965-1967
- Legislative Council Revenue Committee, 1967-1969
- Washington State School Director Association Committee on School Finance, chair, 1964-1965
- Ran again in 1992 for Representative #1 from District 22, but lost to Sandra Romero in the primary.
- Ran against Floyd Conway for Representative #2 from District 22. Lost by 196 votes in the 1970 general election.

- Olympia City Council, 1983-1995—Served on the first council after the council-manager form of government was instituted in Olympia. One of the first two women to serve on the council, along with Joan Kelly.
- Mayor Pro Tem of Olympia, 1990-1993
- Olympia School Board, 1959-1965, served as president
- Attended the 1958 National Democratic Convention in Chicago
- Member of the Democratic State Central Committee, 1970-1971
